- 4) We have been in contact with Flood Management Officers at ERYC and Catchment Officers at the Environment Agency. Before the village meeting, we will have had a site meeting with these Officers to look at the areas noted above. Thus far, there has been a positive

response to the idea of a catchment-based approach to the issues. Any outcomes of the ERYC / EA meeting will be reported at the village meeting.

Thanks again to Wendy for her lovely 'Countryside Concerns'. Just one comment: 12 trees per village? Come on. let's get ambitious we planted 7 in our garden this winter!
